Syrian Religious Leaders Call for Release of Two Bishops

The opening session of the 9th World Assembly of *Religions for Peace* began with a moment of silence for H.E. Metropolitan Mar Gregorios Yohanna Ibrahim, the Syrian Orthodox Archbishop of Aleppo, and Bishop Boulos Yazigi, a Greek Orthodox Bishop in Damascus, who were kidnapped in Syria. Prayers and calls for these bishops' release were made throughout the day.

Father Samuel Gümüs, Special Representative of HB Mor Ignatius Zakka I Iwas, Patriarch of Antioch and All the East, Supreme Head of the Universal Syrian Orthodox Church, called for the immediate release of the two bishops. Father Gümüs implored, "I appeal to conscience, principles, morals, and ethics of all peace lovers to spare no effort to bring about a safe and dignified release of Yohanna Ibrahim and Boulous Yazigi."

"These two bishops always worked for peace and a good life for all people," H.E. Sheikh Dr. Mohamed Sohaib al-Chami, an Islamic scholar and a member of the *Religions for Peace* Interreligious Council of Syria, reflected. "They kidnaped our bishops but they also took our soul, our love, and our hope. We remember their big role and work. And we hope the smile will come reach to each of us and to all of Syria."

Mrs. Asmaa Kiftaro, President of the Syrian Muslim Women's Forum, shared a message of peace. Ms. Kiftaro declared, "Syria will rise again. The sons of Syria will serve their country. Peace and happiness and smiles will come back to the people of Syria."

Dr. William Vendley, Secretary General for *Religions for Peace*, said, "We stand in solidarity, our hands are in your hands, and we continue to pray."

Welcome the Stranger

Leaders of different faiths at the Assembly signed "Welcoming the Stranger: Affirmation for Faith Leaders." The declaration, written by a group of religious leaders in partnership with the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, is a commitment of religious leaders to "welcome the stranger" in their communities.

Dr. Volker Türk, Director of International Protection for the Office of the UNHCR, highlighted that, "The idea of asylum is a legal concept, but its roots, its morals, its values are rooted in all faiths."

The declaration begins, "A core value of my faith is to welcome the stranger, the refugee, the internally displaced, the other. I shall treat him or her as I would like to be treated. I will challenge others, even leaders in my faith community, to do the same."

Father Joseph Maung Win, Director of Karuan Myanmar Social Services rejoiced, "Now that we are free. And being at the Assembly is a great opportunity for us, especially given the theme of the Assembly, 'Welcoming the Other.' For all of us, in all of our religions, we believe in welcoming the other."


















Plenary III: Welcome the Other in Just and Harmonious Societies
