



# Beyond War and Toward Reconciliation: Convening the Second Multi-Religious Peace Roundtable

18-22 February 2024 Tokyo, Japan

#### **Background:**

Against a backdrop of myriad threats to our common home, the international community is plagued by a pervasive sense of insecurity, as reported by the United Nations, citing the highest number of ongoing violent conflicts since the Second World War. Simultaneous armed conflicts in Afghanistan, Colombia, Ethiopia, Israel, Gaza and the West Bank, Myanmar, and Ukraine stand as horrifying examples of the many threats.

Now, the urgent need for new and renewed approaches to peacebuilding, led by multi-religious organisations and diverse religious leaders, remains vital and clear. In this understanding, Religions for Peace launched the **Beyond War and Toward Reconciliation: Multi-Religious Peace Roundtables**. These roundtables bring together multi-religious leaders experienced in serving diverse communities in times of both war and peace, alongside secular policymakers.

Key Focus Areas for the *Multi-Religious Peace Roundtables* include exploring new and innovative strategies to address the evolving landscape of conflict and insecurity, building on past successes while adapting to contemporary challenges, and showcasing instances where diverse religious communities collaborate for peace.

**Global Humanitarian Needs** are at record levels, with over 360 million people worldwide in need of assistance. Among them, over 110 million have been forcibly displaced due to persecution, violent conflict, or human rights violations. The "silent victims" - women, children, and marginalised peoples – are disproportionately deprived and impacted by gross human rights violations.

Addressing Global Challenges to peace and security, sustainable development, and human rights requires sustained collaboration across faiths, cultures, peoples, and sectors. In this context, all religious and faith traditions call upon their followers to work together for the common good of all people and the planet.

Collaborative Initiatives are crucial, emphasising the role of collaboration across faiths for the betterment of humanity and encouraging the involvement of policymakers and governmental entities in peace initiatives.







The inaugural convening of the first *Multi-Religious Peace Roundtable* in September 2022 created a 'safe space' for religious leaders from otherwise warring countries to inspire and support each other. The aim was to heal social divisions, redress trauma, and foster forgiveness and reconciliation for more peaceful, just, and inclusive societies.

## Tokyo Peace Roundtable I:

In September 2022, the first *Multi-Religious Peace Roundtable* brought together diverse religious leaders and government representatives from Burkina Faso, Ethiopia, Myanmar, Russia, South Sudan, Syria, and Ukraine convened in person. Virtual participation included leaders sharing their experiences of humanitarian work from conflict zones supported by *Religions for Peace's Multi-Religious Humanitarian Fund*, spanning Afghanistan, Colombia, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Thailand, and Ukraine.

The objectives of this groundbreaking *Multi-Religious Peace Roundtables* were threefold. Firstly, it sought to **identify and assess** the specific roles of faith leaders working together in war-torn and humanitarian contexts. Secondly, it aimed to **explore** the various strategies employed by multi-religious platforms, including *Religions for Peace Interreligious Councils*, in reconciliation and rebuilding social cohesion efforts. Lastly, the *Multi-Religious Peace Roundtable* endeavored to **assess** the specific value-added of multi-religious humanitarian support provided in diverse contexts, drawing lessons from how such efforts contribute to the (re)building of socially cohesive environments.

Insights from the discussions revealed common challenges faced by faith leaders, including the difficulties in dealing with political dynamics and limitations within religious institutions that hinder the promotion of peaceful rhetoric. The dialogue also included a debate on whether reconciliation is possible amidst ongoing conflicts, emphasising the necessity of continuous dialogue for peace. The inaugural *Multi-Religious Peace Roundtable* concluded with a resounding call for continued dialogue and commitment among faith leaders to serve as peacemakers and bridge builders, recognising their responsibility to heal war-torn communities.

### Tokyo Peace Roundtable II:

Building on the foundation and experience of the first *Multi-Religious Peace Roundtable*, *Religions for Peace* and *Religions for Peace* Japan, with the support of the United Nations Alliance of Civilizations (UNAOC), will convene diverse religious and faith leaders and actors, policymakers, and experts for the second *Beyond War and Toward Reconciliation: Multi-Religious Peace Roundtable* from 19-21 February 2024 in Tokyo, Japan. This *Multi-Religious Peace Roundtable* builds upon the impactful commitments forged during the inaugural *Multi-Religious Peace Roundtable*, including a steadfast dedication to initiating long-term reconciliation processes and preventing the recurrence of violent cycles. Moreover, it seeks to perpetuate the momentum of multi-religious peace dialogues, bringing together leaders from diverse faith traditions to share wisdom and foster cooperative efforts for peace. Central to this endeavor is the profound acknowledgment of the sanctity of human life, underlining the collective imperative to cultivate love for every individual.





The upcoming *Multi-Religious Peace Roundtable* is geared towards convening diverse religious and faith leaders, along with policymakers and experts. Anticipated outcomes of the second *Multi-Religious Peace Roundtable* include the establishment of a replicable and scalable platform for effective peacebuilding actions between multi-religious and secular leaders and policymakers. This *Multi-Religious Peace Roundtable* aims to enhance understanding regarding how multi-religious actions positively influence policymakers in their efforts to rebuild and reconstruct peaceful and inclusive societies. Integral to its goals is the strengthening of bonds of solidarity, engagement, and trust among diverse faith leaders, as well as between religious and secular policymakers and peacebuilders.

Expected participants of this *Multi-Religious Peace Roundtable* will include representatives from: Colombia, Haiti, India, Israel, Japan, Mali, Myanmar, Palestine, Russia, Turkey, and Ukraine.

# Religions for Peace Japan

Religions for Peace (RsP) Japan was established in 1972 as a committee for the international issues supported by Japanese Association of Religious Organisations. We are comprised of delegates from Shinto, Buddhism, Christianity, Islam and newer religious organisations who meet to discuss and practice cooperation for peace, public awareness activities and proposals, peace education and humanitarian contributions. We work together in the Peace Research Institute – whose members are scholars of varied religious backgrounds – as well as women's and youth groups. It also has the support of those who belong to or appreciate the religious communities represented in its membership. Each of these groups is playing a distinct role in implementing the various projects and activities of RsP Japan.

Under the theme of "Caring for our Common Future: Advancing Shared Well-Being," *RfP* Japan had developed its activities based on the action guidelines of promoting (1) network-building, (2) raising-awareness and advocacy, (3) peace education, and (4) humanitarian assistance. *RfP* Japan has utilised online and social networking services to conduct our action plans. We also set up 5 Task Force Teams, to (1) Stop Nuclear Dependence (2) Respond to Climate Crisis, (3) Promote Education for Reconciliation, (4) Prevent Trafficking in Persons, and (5) Provide Disaster Relief and those 5 task force teams played key roles to address those issues and implement action-oriented activities.

### Network-Building

We take initiatives in network-building by participating in world assemblies of *Religions for Peace* and in assemblies of the Asian Conference of *Religions for Peace*, facilitating dialog on peace and stability in countries amid conflicts, building better understanding on multiple religions, and cooperating and collaborating with peace organisations in various sectors.

### Raising-Awareness and Advocacy







We advocate for the reduction of armaments and the abolition of nuclear weapons, address issues related to nuclear power generation and energy supply, as well as environmental degradation and poverty, and produce urgent statements occasionally.

#### Peace Education

Task Force Team to Promote Education for Reconciliation leads peace education in RfP Japan by holding seminars to educate people who bring about reconciliation from grass root to international level by overcoming various confliction. The seminars offer conflict transformation methods, practice of dialogue with diverse communities, and learning opportunities about peace building activities by specialists including academics, NGOs and religious communities. Moreover, it puts high value on the problem-solving methods based on dialogue and the dignity of life and spirituality, not by violent or military power.

#### Humanitarian Assistance

We make immediate actions by providing humanitarian assistance (send out emergency fundraising calls and statements) and implement programs to support recovery to those affected by disasters around the world.
